

Semester 1 Reporting

Most senior students have completed their assessment for this term and are starting on the next topics in their subjects. Students in Years 7 - 10 are still completing assessment up to the end of Week 9. Reports will be completed by staff and handed to students on Monday 19 July (Week 2, Term 3). Learning Conversations will occur on Monday 26 July (Week, 3 Term 3) and the booking process will be similar to the successful conversation evening held earlier this term.

Ayr SHS Positive Behaviour System - Reboot by Ms Courtney Carrigan, PBL Committee

Ayr SHS is a Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) school. It is a framework that provides a consistent whole school approach to promote positive behaviours and to improve student academic and behavioural outcomes. This term, our PBL committee have been working to improve our positive behaviour system with a focus on the way Hawk Points are used. The aim is to embed this updated system in Term 3. Our current system is focused on the 'individual' student and on receiving 'rewards', whereas this reboot focuses on the whole school as a community/family and on acknowledging our values.

New 'Acknowledgement' System:

- a move away from 'rewards' to 'acknowledgement' specifically focusing on the positive things our students do, so they will continue to do them because they link to good values (which is what we want our students to have/demonstrate and not because they might get a reward for doing something).
- fostering good values in our students and aligning our PBL framework to our school values - building on our positive culture of belonging, connectedness and being a part of our 'Ayr High Family' - having a community focus rather than an individual focus.
- wanting students to find/develop intrinsic motivation rather than extrinsic. "When the rewards stop, people usually return to the way they acted before the program began" (Alfie Kohn, 1994).
- using Hawk Points in a meaningful and authentic manner teachers having a specific focus for their classroom, using Hawk Points as a recognition for something done/achieved and informing students why they are receiving a
- the removal of Term 'Rewards' boxes/prizes from our system this focused solely on the individual and an element of 'luck' was needed to win a prize.
- the introduction of the Acknowledgement Box a whole school approach to meet targets that will be actioned/celebrated by the entire student body (aligns to our values of 'Ayr High Family'); students will have a greater voice to express their ideas and select the targets on the box.

Redesign of Hawk Point:

- our Hawk Point has been redesigned to reflect these changes. It focuses on acknowledging students for:
 - Personal Best Work i.e. putting in 110% effort, completing all/specific class work to best of ability.
 - Positive & Respectful Conduct i.e. followed entry routines, assisting

another student/staff/community member in a positive manner, acting with

- Extra-curricular/Community Service i.e. attending ANZAC service/s, volunteering to coach/referee school sport, Interact food stall helper at our Interhouse Carnivals.

Rollout of this System:

- Teaching staff have received information about the changes and have had opportunities to consider how they will adopt these changes into their practice.
- · Students had the opportunity to attend a session earlier in the Term to hear ideas and voice their thoughts.
- Students were informed that changes are occurring on whole school assembly in Week 7.
- All students will receive specific details of the changes to this system in week 8 and 9 in Wellbeing, HPE and AWP lessons.
- Students will have the opportunity to complete a survey in week 9/10 to select targets for the Acknowledgement Box.

We look forward to continuing to build our positive culture within the school and making sure we all feel like we belong to the 'Ayr High Family'.




